Giving Tuesday Gifts to Advance Increase



On December 1, nearly 6,000 donors from 27 countries contributed \$2.8 million through The Advance of the United Methodist Church on Giving Tuesday, up from \$2.5 million last year. John 21.15-17

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him 'Feed my sheep.

One of the things I have learned about this congregation is that we like projects. We might even go so far as to say that is how we fulfill Jesus' command "to feed my sheep" as seen in the gospel lesson above. One definition the dictionary offers for project is "*an individual or collaborative enterprise that is carefully planned and designed to achieve a particular aim*". Our aim in tending Jesus' sheep is quite varied, while very neighborly:

- *literally feeding people
- *clothing people
- *contributing to the physical and ministry needs of the congregation
- *providing housekeeping articles at a reasonable price at the rummage sales
- *keeping our property "green" & environmentally sound.
- *providing children and youth ministries

I would guess that Garrison Keiler's words about Methodists are fairly accurate for us when he says, referring to United Methodists,

"If you are dying, they will comfort you. If you are lonely, they will talk to you. And if you are hungry, they will give you tuna salad!"

It is in our DNA, straight from the heart of God, for God's sake, to be good neighbors through our projects. But, that definition of project is not the only one the dictionary offers. Another one is just as important to us as disciples of Jesus Christ. This definition requires changing the short "o" in the first syllable into a long "o". To project is to "extend outward beyond something else; protrude or to cause (a figure or image) to appear, as on a background." For us as the church to simply do projects is not enough; our projects, our ministries need to be a projection of the love of God in Jesus Christ onto our neighbors, emanating from our warmed hearts, to use good Wesleyan language. In this way, we will be communicating clearly and forcefully that we see Jesus in the face of each of our neighbors.

Thus, it seems, as good as our projects are, we are not always as clear as to what we are projecting through them. Since he came back home to Wisconsin three and a half years ago, Bishop Jung has been encouraging us as United Methodists to *Imagine Wisconsin Anew*, which he sees as us being *constantly challenged to "imagine anew" a world of peace, love, kindness, gentleness and self-control*. In his April 2015 monthly pastoral letter, he addresses the need to have something to project:

Almost everything in life is determined by our relationship with Jesus Christ. How we treat others, how we treat the world and the world's resources, how we use the gifts that we are given and who receives them. How we do this and how our lives are formed, are determined by our living relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

We find ourselves growing more and more like Jesus in our relationships with others. More loving, more generous, more compassionate, more dedicated, more committed, more self-forgiving and forgiving of others, more in love with God, and more connected to each other and the world in which we live.

This seems to be a sound explanation of what we are to project through our projects, our ministries.

Life is good for us United Methodists in this part of Portage County located in central Wisconsin. As this Strategic document will show, we have an abundance of all we need "to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world". Opportunities for faithful discipleship by way of projecting our love for Jesus Christ through our projects abound as we are faithful to God through our *prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness*". We are only limited in our ability to make disciples and be good neighbors as we limit our capacity for growing in love with Jesus through the Christian disciplines of prayer, Scripture reading & study, worship, Christian fellowship, generous giving of our money and witnessing to our faith. In a recent edition of *Weavings*, a Journal of the Christian Spiritual Life, one author says, *a clear sense of one's identity in God is the foundation upon which all discipleship and ministry are built*.

Bishop Jung says,

“The time challenges us to be bold and adventurous...Wake up to our identity in God (knowing it) is not for the faint of heart. Neither is discipleship. Neither is ministry. In truth, it’s usually pretty disorienting and quite disruptive.”

This document may seem quite disruptive for some and yet for others not unsettling enough. The good news is that much of our ministry is solid, with effective leadership, leaving us feeling good. The other good news is that God has blessed us abundantly, freeing us from the fear of not enough.

*We have facilities aching with a desire to be filled with ministries and used by our community guests. Our facility in Plover provides us with an existing footprint in that growing part of the County begging us to take advantage of our United Methodist presence there.

*Another resource we have are leaders, some who need some rest, some who need encouragement and other folk who need to recognize their call from God to help us grow disciples for the transformation of the world.

*We have money in abundance. We know that because when “Projects” are announced it pours in. We need more people to increase their giving for the everyday needs that help us do our projects and have an effective and vital ministry as United Methodists in this area.

*The most important resource we have is the God we love and serve in Jesus’ name. We need more and more people calling upon this rich and loving resource to fill us with compassion and energy to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

No different than Peter, Jesus is asking us “Do you love me?” which is the making disciples facet of our ministry. And, Jesus commands us to “feed my sheep”, the transformation piece of our mission, the directive to be good neighbors. -Pastor Howard

From The Vision Team

Recommendations identified by the Vision Team:

In giving prayerful consideration to these proposed recommendations we based our thoughts on expanding our boundaries of who we are and who we are called to serve. We did not want to put limits on ourselves or narrow the vision of who Jesus Christ desires us to be. We desire to be all that Jesus wants us to be and that these opportunities give us the chance to witness to our faith through our actions and grow our presence within our community.

Our Action Items:

1. The church council will be the governing body over the Vision Recommendations and Strategic Action Plan document. This document is to be a living document for the period of January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2020. The governing body should accept accountability for directing the actions required to live out our vision by supporting the approved action items with appropriate time, money and resources. At the appropriate time, the Church Council shall appoint another visioning team to evaluate and revise the Strategic and Vision Plan of the church for the years 2021 through 2025.
2. The Church Council will approve the revised Mission Statement, proposed Vision Statement and revised Core Values at their first Church Council meeting in January 2016.
3. The church will elect a Lay Leader to organize a committee for the purpose of developing the action plan and curriculum necessary for growing disciples of Jesus Christ by the 3rd quarter of 2016.
4. The church will develop a new approval/evaluation process designed to identify new ministry program’s purpose and expectations by the end of 3rd quarter 2016.
5. The church will assemble a special committee for the purpose of developing a plan for growing and strengthening our United Methodist presence in the Plover community by the 4th quarter of 2016.
6. The church will complete a cost assessment of our church property and building needs to evaluate its one image and functionality by the end of the 2nd quarter of 2016.
7. The Church Council will complete a yearend report of accomplished vision tasks and a proposed list of future tasks at each Annual Church Conference.
